Ask anyone who knows a greyhound, and they will tell you all about their quiet, gentle nature. What you may not know is that greyhounds are quite lazy and prefer to be in a warm and comfortable bed rather than running around. Greyhounds make the perfect buddy because they are affectionate and sensitive. They are also extremely loyal pups.



DID YOU KNOW?

Of the hundreds of breeds of dogs in the world, greyhounds are the fastest. However, they are not strong swimmers, and their tight leg muscles make it hard for many of them to sit down comfortably.

Because of the positioning of their eyes, greyhounds have up to 270-degree field vision, meaning they can see some of the back of their own head! Humans have a vision field of around 180 degrees.

GREYHOUNDS IN TROUBLE - RACING

People race greyhounds to make money, not because it makes dogs happy. The dogs can get injured during races and their injuries can be so bad that they cannot be made well and are killed. In the 2019 season, 54 greyhounds were put to sleep after tumbles on the racecourse. On top of that, 297 dogs were put to sleep because they couldn't race and were not rehomed.

Some people think it's okay to race greyhounds, but we know that racing dogs is just mean. A greyhound belongs with a loving forever family, not on a racetrack!

CRUELTY-FREE CHALK

INGREDIENTS

- ¾ cup of plaster powder
- ½ cup of water
- Food colouring
- A tray of silicone moulds or lined toilet paper rolls

METHOD

- Mix the plaster powder and water, making a soupy paste. Add more water if you need to.
- 2 Add the food colouring 2-3 drops at a time and mix well until you have the colour you like.
- 3 Add the mixture to the mould and let it set overnight.
- 4 Remove the chalk sticks from the moulds, and they are ready to use!



DIY BEST FRIEND TREATS

BAKE YOUR OWN DOG TREATS FROM SCRATCH.

INGREDIENTS

- 1½ cup rolled oats
- 1 cup mashed banana
- ½ cup unsalted peanut butter

BONUS HUMANS

THEY'RE SAFE FOR HUMANS TO EAT, TOO!

INSTRUCTIONS

- Blend the rolled oats in a food processor until you have a fine flour.
- 2 Smash the banana and peanut butter together. Add the oat flour and mix until you have a dough.
- Roll out your dough with a rolling pin and use cookie cutters to cut out your treats.
- 4 Bake at 180°C for 10-15 minutes, or until golden.
- 5 Make sure your treats are completely cool before feeding them to your pup.

SHOTTBREAD FOR SHARING

INGREDIENTS

- 250g of margarine
- 1 cup of icing sugar
- 1 cup of cornflour
- 2 cup of flour


INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 Preheat oven to 180°C.
- 2 Cream margarine and icing sugar together until light and fluffy.
- 3 Sift cornflour and flour into the sugar and margarine, and mix until just combined.
- 4 Roll out half the mixture at a time on a floured board until just under 1 cm thick.
- 5 Cut into shapes and put onto a greased oven tray.
- 6 Re-roll leftovers until you have used all the dough.
- 7 Do the same with the other half.
- 8 Bake for around 10 minutes, being careful not to burn the edges.
- 9 Cool on the oven tray then transfer onto a wire rack until cool.
